Finances



The Franciscan Montessori Earth School is a part of the Franciscan Life Center Network. Our finances are audited internally on a regular basis, and the entire Franciscan Life Center Network is audited annually. This audited report provides us with the information that we use in annual reports, strategic planning, and fundraising solicitations and proposals.

We consider our financial outlook in a variety of ways, both locally and as part of the Franciscan Life Center Network. Our Finance Committee is part of the Advisory Council, and working in concert with Administration, our Business Manager and Finance Committee members help craft our approach to tuition, budgeting, and allocations of funds for salaries, facilities, and programs. Within the Advisory Council, ongoing discussion and updating of the Strategic Plan helps to determine how both our income and expenditures are allocated. These plans are further discussed, refined, and approved by the Board of the Franciscan Life Center Network.

We value not only the gift of trust you provide when you enroll your student, we also understand the expectations that you have for us to use your tuition dollars wisely. We understand that our goal must always be the best value for your tuition, reflected in the quality of your student's education. This year, with enrollment matching the conservative numbers that we had budgeted for,

we find ourselves with a sound financial picture. This consistent enrollment, and the subsequent planning to best serve these students, will continue to be part of the financial planning scheduled for the near future.

Furthermore, we continue to maintain a modest cash reserve, even after the costs of ongoing renovations during the summer of 2018. We have had a steady flow of gifts in our fundraising endeavors, and we still have our annual Auction (April 13 2019) to add to our fundraising efforts. As a school with revenues in excess of \$3,000,000, and as an institution that is home to more than 300 students and over 60 staff, it is a testament to the efforts of all concerned with our finances that not only has our school survived, it continues to flourish and grow. **Thank you!**

Challenges

Our tuition strives to maximize the value of your tuition dollars, while at the same time recognizing our need to constantly grow and improve to stay competitive and relevant. As an institution, and as a school, our success has always been in offering unique opportunities to a diverse and growing community. The Earth school business model is firmly based on a commitment to the needs of our students and our community. These goals have remained consistent since the beginning of the school in 1977.

Our primary challenges consist of addressing both how we fund our operations, and how we ensure that all families that wish to have an education at the Earth School can be supported in their quest. As we address planning for the future of FMES, these concepts will remain paramount in our planning.

Each year, we assess and address the state of our facilities, our staff, and our support infrastructure to ensure that they remain within the guidelines of our strategic planning. These plans seek to address, and continually reflect, a sound understanding of the overall needs of the entire community. In the last year we have made significant upgrades to our facilities, such as adding classroom HVAC and new flooring and cabinetry to provide more comfortable and useable classrooms. We continue to seek the funds to grow and expand, while ensuring that we adequately plan for the use of operational monies to provide for a safe, secure, and meaningful educational community.

We also seek to better place the school within the awareness of the area community, allowing prospective families to have the maximum opportunity to consider FMES as a school of choice. These Marketing and Admissions strategies are a key component of those challenges that the Earth School must confront. In addition to the ever-growing number of schools that represent our competition, the nature of marketing and media outreach evolves constantly, creating an increasingly complex marketing situation for schools. We are not alone in seeking to confront this challenge as we seek to heighten the profile of the school within the private school community in and around Portland. We will continue promoting the message that the Earth School is a dynamic alternative, worthy of the consideration of all interested families. This competitive market provides alternatives for families in ever-increasing numbers, and sharing the message that the Earth School is the best possible educational option remains one of our most persistent challenges.

Drawing on the combined talents and expertise of our staff, the Franciscan Community, and the Advisory Council and consultants, we continually change and upgrade school programs to help guide this process. As we constantly seek to enhance programs, provide for staff training, and add other necessary upgrades to our programs, the challenges

presented in the oversight of such a large program and facility are ongoing.

The Earth School confronts these challenges with an able staff, a devoted and capable Advisory Council, the constant support of the Franciscan Community, and the constant support of our parent community. With their support, we will address our challenges, confident that the changes we enact will create a school that best reflects the needs of the entire community. The Earth School will confront these issues as always – with a firm conviction and faith in the entire community that supports us.

Chess

Chess sets at the Earth School are impossible to miss. Since 1977, Chess sets have been all around the school. Pictures from today, and pictures from yesterday, clearly illustrate that connection. Since 2002 that connection has been made a dynamic part of the school by virtue of the efforts of Montessori Guide Gladys Munoz. Working with the Oregon Scholastic Chess Federation and Chess for Success, our students have not only learned the intricacies of Chess strategy. They have competed at many levels successfully Here's a look at just a few of the many examples of Chess at FMES.



Strategic Planning

Each year at the Earth School, Strategic Planning is a key element of planning. Several years ago we created the basic long and short term planning templates for the Strategic Plan, emphasizing the goal of sustainability and measured growth as being key to the future of the Franciscan Montessori Earth School and St. Francis Academy. Even with constantly changing situations driving revisions, these baseline documents ensure that our plans reflect solid parameters for strategic decisions.

Each year our strategic plan is updated with the Administration, Advisory Board and its Committees, and the Governing Board of the Franciscan Life Center Network. (This group represents the entire Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist's Professional network). Based on our previous strategic plans, each year the current plan is a dynamic document, which allows for deliberate planning steps, but also allows for changes necessitated by circumstance. Every year we initiate a very comprehensive rewrite of our near-term strategic plans, drawing in members participating in committees from throughout our extended community. This year our successful accreditation process with the Western Catholic Educational Association will be part of our planning. This form of accreditation will allow the school to best represent our position not only as a Montessori Independent School, but as a "Catholic Montessori School". How this new perception of the Earth School will emerge in our revised strategic plans will be an ongoing conversation with all concerned stakeholders. Other proposed changes, such as the potential to pursue AMI accreditation for our Children's House program, will also be part of our short and long-term plans.

This is a very comprehensive process, and represents our initial steps in providing an overall Montessori Accreditation for the Earth School.

Our Alumni

Colin Timothy O'Brady was born on March 16, 1985 in Olympia, Washington, but was raised in Portland, Oregon. He attended the Franciscan Montessori Earth School, Mt. Tabor Middle School, and graduated from Lincoln High School in 2002.

Colin is an American professional endurance athlete, motivational speaker and adventurer. O'Brady is a three-time world record holder. In 2016 he set the Explorers Grand Slam (Last Degree) and Seven Summits speed records. He became the fastest person to complete the adventurers challenges in 139 days and 131 days respectively. In the summer of 2018, O'Brady set the speed record for the 50 US High Points in 21 days.

O'Brady is a former professional triathlete. He represented the United States on the ITU Triathlon World Cup circuit, racing in 25 countries on six continents from 2009–2015.

In December 2018 O'Brady completed a crossing of parts of Antarctica (excluding the ice shelves of Filchner-Ronne and Ross), the first unaided and unsupported solo crossing of the land mass of Antarctica.
